According to Howard, Needles, Tammen, and Bergendoff, page 54, by 1990 there will be a total of 639,000 aircraft movements at Madison Municipal Airport, and according to the Mead & Hunt Report, page 32, over 30% of these flights will take off to the South and 20% will land from the South. Assuming that 30% of the flights will occur over East Madison, one arrives at the figure of 191,700 flights. I think it would be safe to assume these flights would occur on 110 days or 30% of the time when planes will have to land and take off to the South. Dividing 110 days into 191,700 aircraft movements amounts to 1,742 flights per day or 72 flights per hour over our homes.

The proponents might claim that Truax Field will not handle 639,000 flights with two parallel runways; but if anyone would support a plan that is as unreasonable, illogical, and indefensible as the proposed plan is, he certainly would support additional non-instrumented parallel runways between the two instrumented parallel runways. Non-instrumented runways can be located as close together as 700 feet.

The proponents of the plan claim that there isn't enough opposition to the parallel configuration. Are the 1007 signatures on petitions from less than two-thirds of the Third Ward or the approximately 170 people who voiced their opposition to the proposed runway at LaFollette High to be ignored? How much opposition is needed against it?

If you are really opposed to more planes over your homes, schools, and place of worship, please try to attend the Council meeting on March 10 at 7:30 P.M. to show your opposition to the plan and your support for a referendum. After the runway is built and we have the noise, the pollution, and the hazards it will be too late. Call Mayor Dyke (238-4856) or Alderman Hall (222-7200) and voice your opposition.

PORTRAIT OF A NEIGHBOR

We of Madison have been most fortunate in attracting some of the finest educators in the profession. A very good example of this is our own principal at Elvehjem, Mr. Clifford Howard. He came to Madison by choice because he liked Madison and felt it is a very good place to raise and educate his children.

Jean and Clifford Howard, with their three children, reside at 1606 Vondron Road. Craig, the oldest, is a junior at Platteville State University while Kirk, a senior, and Janis, a sophomore, attend LaFollette High School.

Before coming to Elvehjem, Mr. Howard was principal at Lakewood Elementary School here in Madison. Prior to that he was principal of the Union Grove Elementary School in Racine County.

Originally Mr. Howard had planned on being an engineer, but fortunately for us he changed his mind. He is a graduate of Platteville State University, with a major in Secondary Education. He also attended Iowa State University. His post-graduate work in Elementary Education was taken at Platteville and he received his Masters Degree at Marquette University. He did additional work at Michigan State University. He spent one summer doing graduate work at the University of Milwaukee on a N.D.E.A. Scholarship. Just recently he completed a course in Educational Psychology at Edgewood College.

It appears that Mr. Howard has been doing nothing but going to school, but he did take time out to serve his country. In World War II he served with the 8th Air Force stationed in England.

In June when school is out Mr. Howard goes to the School Forest, which is a conservation program for junior high boys. This program lasts from 4 to 5 weeks, leaving him with just a couple of weeks to spend with his family before getting ready for the new Fall session.

For relaxation the Howards like to go camping but with the family growing up it's getting a little difficult to get them together. In his leisure hours he also enjoys puttering in the yard and a little golfing.

In Mr. Howard's words, "The cooperation of the parents here at Elvehjem has been very good. This is evident by the attendance at the Parent-Teacher Conferences."

With the field of Education being the challenge it is today, we commend Mr. Howard for the fine job he is doing in meeting this challenge. It is most comforting to us parents knowing we have such a fine and capable administrator in charge of our most priceless commodity, our children. Let's hope Mr. Howard remains happy with our school and our neighborhood.
