The Echo: History and Future

The Elvehjem Echo first published in 1968 with Harold Smith presiding as Board President. Its early issues feature articles on bridge & euchre gatherings, spraying for mosquitoes, advocating for street lights & traffic control, parent/child events, and much much more. Remember, until a couple decades ago the primary modes of communication were snail mail and landlines—technology has come a long way!

We recently asked for firsthand accounts about earlier days of the Echo, here are a few highlights:

"I remember Maxine Cleven as being very active in the early years of the ENA and writing for the Echo. She always included a favorite recipe." - **Robert J.**

"I remember delivering Echos on foot in the mid-70s. My route would have been in the Academy and Starker area. I want to say I made \$4/mo." - **Gary G.**

"Jan Herold was the editor/typist for the Echo from '73-83. Jan, my wife, and I (Larry D.) handled printing, collating, and stapling during those years. Jan Fumoso designed the ENA logo pictured below.

Layout in those days (before word processing) was done on an electric typewriter. Each article was first typed into columns then cut and pasted into a page layout to fit on an 8 1/2 X 11 pages. Once the layout was finalized, it was then typed onto the mimeograph stencils. The mimeograph stencils were fitted onto the mimeograph machine and cranked for each page. Pages were printed front and back so each sheet had to be run through the machine twice. Multiple pages were printed for each edition so pages had to be manually collated then stapled.

Distribution was handled by Wendy Tennyson and Trudy Baumgartner. They were in charge of the delivery kids.

Kids were paid with gift certificates not money. The kids were forced to quit when child labor laws were applied.

The Echo staff also included a sunshine person, Marsha Briggs. Sunshine would send out greetings for special events like births and anniversaries as well as condolences for neighbors who have passed.

The ENA included the homes on the south side of Buckeye Rd. The area would later split from the ENA when they formed the East Buckeye NA." - **Larry D.**



"I delivered Echos for a few years when I was a preteen in '94-96. Someone would drop off a stack of papers with rubber bands. I would either walk or ride a bike-weather depending-and put one on everyone's door handle with the rubber band once per month... They paid me with an \$8 gift certificate to East Towne Mall each time." - **Doug T.**

"In 1996 the Echo was still hand-cranked from a mimeograph machine. I think I was LVM President when we started to use a print shop... I took pride in writing the President's column. It was a great way to pass on information you could not get easily elsewhere. With the [eventual] help of email lists, we could get information out timely. That was a thrill." - **Karl K.**

"Deliveries were by neighborhood kids... Every month no matter the weather." - Mary B.

2022 will mark the 54th year of the Echo's publishing—the longest continuous of all of Madison's neighborhood associations. It also marks our shift to quarterly publishing along with the debut of our first monthly recurring e-newsletter, the Elvehjem Extra.

We're very excited to be making these updates both for sake of our environment (17,600 fewer sheets of paper being printed) and the ever-evolving technological landscape. In a time where more and more people are leaving social media, we're glad to be introducing an option that will keep Elvehjem residents in the know for many years to come.

New alder districts and wards will go into effect January 1, 2022. Changes to District 16 include:

- Additions of the Reston Heights, Sprecher East, Door Creek and Meadowlands neighborhoods. District 16 will now have 13,863 residents, based on 2020 Census data
- The Glendale Neighborhood (which is currently split between Districts 15 and 16), will become entirely within District 16

Due to gaining new constituents and the wide ranging topics I have been contacted about, I have decided to begin hosting virtual office hours in 2022!

The intent of office hours will be to provide you with varying, yet consistent times to be able to connect with me. I intend to start these meetings by the end of the 1st quarter and offer at least one opportunity to meet/month.

RECIPE: CHEESY WILD RICE SOUP

Adapted from Taste of Home

"We often eat easy-to-make soups when there's not a lot of time to cook. I replaced the wild rice in the original recipe with a boxed rice mix. This creamy concoction is now a favorite."

Ingredients (8 servings):

- 1 package (6.2 ounces) fast-cooking long grain and wild rice mix
- 4 cups 2% milk
- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cream of potato soup, undiluted
- 8 ounces Velveeta, cubed
- 1/2 pound bacon strips, cooked and crumbled
- Optional: Minced chives and oyster crackers

Directions (30min to make):

- 1. In a large saucepan, prepare rice mix according to package directions.
- 2. Add the milk, soup and cheese. Cook and stir until cheese is melted.
- 3. Garnish with bacon and, if desired, minced fresh chives and oyster crackers.
